Course description

Left-wing ideas returned to prominence in the wake of the 2008 financial crash and what Mark Fisher called the 'slow cancellation of the future'; even by 2019 having been held to have 'won the argument' about the nature of capitalism. This course provides students with a longer intellectual history of post-war British socialism. Structured around set-piece debates on the Left, it examines how socialist thinkers tackled issues including affluence, the end of empire, globalisation, the dissolution of the 'traditional' working class and the rise of New Right. It will assess how they engaged with theoretical frameworks such as class, culture, gender, race and the

self. Through analysis of primary and secondary material, students will attain a detailed understanding of the intellectual history of British socialism, and the changing cultural, social and political context of late twentieth-century Britain.

Teaching methods: 1 x 3-hour slot. 1 hour lecture then two hour seminar.

Indicative syllabus

- 2. Culture and society in the 1950s
- 3. Modernising Britain: socialist theory and the 'Nairn-Anderson thesis'
- 4. 1968 and after
- 5. Liberation and new social movements
- 6. Culture and counter-hegemony
- 7. Race, nation and the crisis
- 8. Understanding 'Thatcherism'
- 9. 'City Limits': Local government and politics of the city in the 1980s
- 10. 'New Times' and the 1990s
- 11. Conclusion: Austerity, 'Generation Left' and Corbynism

Assessment
