Reflections on a new and improved Muriel Stott

As a former student, the news of the refurbishment project for Muriel Stott is certainly a breath of fresh air. I remember stepping into Muriel Stott for the first time, and my initial thought was, 'this room is freezing!'

While I appreciated the silent study space, my concentration could only stretch so far when all I could think (or feel) was that I should have worn an extra layer. With this new project, it's interesting to see what will become of this space.

I had the absolute delight of being part of the Muriel Stott workshop held on 18 October, which was dedicated to this transformation project. The mission: to sprinkle some 'wow' over our Library and our students' experience with a new and improved Muriel Stott space. Against a backdrop of student suggestions, the creative group of staff were quick to share inspiring thoughts such as the very popular conservatory and an inclusive adaptable space, and some more adventurous concepts such as a Doctor Who Tardis. Managing risk and reputation presentation

On Friday, 6 October I made my contribution to 'Strategic Practice in Libraries', one of the course units in our new MA Library and Archive Studies. I co-delivered a session on 'Managing Risk and Reputation' with Ben Wiggins, Senior Lecturer for the programme.

Ben and I met in September to plan the two-hour workshop, which we wanted to be as interactive as possible. Our aim was to get the students thinking about the roles that different members of staff play when responding to emergency situations, as well as the communication and engagement activity needed during and after a reputational risk. It won't come as a surprise that one of the scenarios we asked them to respond to was dealing with a flood in the Library!

I spoke about the Library's approach to business continuity planning and the strategies we use within the Engagement Team to organise our crisis communications. I shared the timeline and the content of communications sent to different stakeholder groups (Library staff, students and University staff) during the September 2021 flood (when the mains water pipe burst on Oxford Road and flooded the basements in AGLC and Main Library).

The students seemed really engaged with the tasks and I hope it has helped them understand how teams across the Library work together in times of emergency.

At the start of the session Ben had also asked me to spend a few minutes sharing my own 'pathway to libraries' which I was glad to do. As someone who began their career in libraries, switched to marketing and then was able to combine the two, I hope it encouraged the students to consider the wide range of opportunities that working in libraries offers.

A conversation with the University of Nottingham Libraries

In late October, Amar met with Lauren Bjorn (Strategy, Performance and Data Manager), and Julie Pa<mark>rtridge</mark> (Associate Director, Customer Services) from the University of Nottingham Libraries.

The University of Nottingham recently acquired a small site in Nottingham city centre, which will be used to create the 'Castle Meadow Campus' where postgraduate business school and executive education students will study alongside actual operational businesses. Halpin Partnership, a HE consultancy firm employed by the University of Nottingham to research facilities and services that business school students would value, identified Alliance Manchester Business School as a 'benchmark partner'.

In designing library services and facilities, and identifying key resources for the Castle Meadow Campus, Lauren and Julie met with Amar to learn more about the library service we provide specifically to AMBS students. In what turned out to be quite a wide-ranging conversation, we were able to share a great deal of useful information and experience. Laura and Julie had this to say: "Thank you so much for the additional info, and thanks again for taking the time to meet with us earlier this week. It's been very helpful."
