## 'If Black Lives Matter, Black Excellence Must Also Matter' by Feyisayo Johnson

So often, Black History Month is overcast by the cloud of colonial atrocities and institutional racism which permeate and uphold past and present societies. This tends to overshadow the true celebration of Black culture and Excellence, which should equally characterize Black History Month.
