EVIDENCING THE DIMENSIONS OF THE UKPSF: REFLECTION



In order to sufficiently evidence how your practice aligns to the UKPSF, your discussion of this practice must be reflective. 'Evidence of reflection' is not listed as an individual criterion for fellowship, as you need to take a reflective approach to developing your case studies overall and demonstrate this reflection in your portfolio.

HOW DO I EVIDENCE THIS?

It is not enough to list what you have done in your case studies: it is crucial that you reflect on your approaches, how you developed these, why you chose these approaches, how successful they were and how you seek to enhance your practice. Your assessors want to hear about what you thought, felt or learned about and from your experience, and this reflection is a fundamental function (and benefit) of the Advance HE fellowship application process.

Demonstrating reflection on how you teach and/or support learning is a key aspect of any LEAP portfolio, and your case studies must be sufficiently reflective in order to be awarded any of the four categories of Advance HE fellowship. The depth of reflection you are required to demonstrate in order to meet requirements will differ with the category of fellowship, given the differences in word count / time limits and the breadth and impact of practice you are evidencing.
