- Collaboration through dialogue and or/action



Be aware: Language is a barrier to accessing e.g. healthcare information

- Non-native English speaking communities in UK/USA have higher mortality and disease risk
- Scientific and medical English was poorly understood (if at all)
- You may need to take a step back and think how best to build a community of trust and a shared language to discuss the research.




Community-based public engagement with health: English for speakers of other languages (ESOL) classes

Research, policy and engagement:


94% prevalence of S. mansoni in school age children in rural Marolambo Distri

Impact:

- Targeted MDA to treat the disease
- Improved awareness of disease and transmission
- Prevalence decreased to 88%
- Heavy infection decreased from 32 to 17%
- Increased uptake of MDA from 61%-89%



Pollutants cause and worsen respiratory conditions






 "...to gather data from the general population on seasonal allergy symptoms (asthma, hay fever), and where and when they occur, using 'citizens as sensors'"










To scientific data... Urban areas experience significantly worse allergy symptoms



- Symptom reports were labelled as urban or rural
- Urban (gold) vs rural (green) symptom severity
- Symptoms were more severe and lasted longer in urban areas


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Report back: sharing consultations

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Lessons learned from working with diverse communities

- Involve community in ALL aspects of the project in order to ensure they have a voice, are a genuine part of the project
- Utilise existing networks and key actors to amplify project
- LISTEN!!
- Communicate clearly the goals, limitations etc.
- SHARE findings
- Consider legacies for the community- e.g. training, payment....
- Creative methods e.g. art can bridge issues like language constraints
- Go to them!
