

Project Title: Misogyny and online gender-based violence

Project Investigators:

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Project overview:

Sexism and misogyny abound and structure our everyday lives. Recently, they have taken new forms in online spaces. One venue is the ‘manosphere’ — online communities of disaffected males where speech about gender-based violence is amplified and normalized. These communities espouse an ideology that encourages participating boys and men to view and treat women in dehumanising ways. It promotes a culture of patriarchal violence that serves to police gender norms, so as to ensure that women conform to traditional gender roles. This culture justifies violence when women deviate from these roles and norms. At the heart of this ideology is a narrative of aggrieved entitlement and reversed victimhood motivated by anger and grievance. In this project we study how this narrative is deployed in incel (involuntary celibate) communities and how it’s used to justify violent extremism.

This project is a continuation of Seedcorn project 2022/2023. In the previous project, we scraped over 6 million comments from a popular incel forum and started linguistic and theoretical analysis of the data. In this project, we continued the analysis of the data and developed theoretical avenues. Whilst often projects concerning misogyny focus on the target of misogynistic speech (i.e. woman) this project highlights the way in which the perpetrators of misogynistic speech construct their identities in relation to an ideology that facilitates misogyny.

Key findings:

Empirical Side:

- We established clear hierarchies in the incel forum based on the number of posts from the users, these are categorised into 4 groups: ‘greycels’ (new members), low-rank, high-rank, and ‘paragon’ (the highest ranks). Further, we classified 2 groups of users who have been expelled from the community – banned users – and users who have chosen to leave – self-banned/deleted users. We found clear linguistic patterns among different groups; we discovered that high-rank users tend to police other members; we found that specific topics (e.g. mentioning a lot of statistics and asking questions were common among ‘banned’ users.

- We employed ‘move analysis’ to explore the self-referent use of ‘subhuman’ in the incel community. Lily (the linguistics RA) manually coded 14 different moves/communicative functions, e.g. subhuman was used in order to establish ‘truecel’ status, refer to one’s appearance, and describe how others perceive them. We hypothesise that referring to oneself as a ‘subhuman’ plays a vital part in establishing incel identities.

Theoretical Side:

- Taboos are exploited in the community as a way to distinguish ‘us vs them’ divide. Acting contrary to mainstream norms is vital, hence using slurs, aggressive language, and self-derogatory content.
- Incels create novel terms using the -cel suffix (e.g. heightcel/ = incels because of one’s height). They use these neologisms to revise their social role of a man that expects them to pursue heterosexual relationships into ideological roles that highlight how not all men can dominate women and engage in heterosexual relationships. Importantly, the forum provides a safe space in which terms like ‘heightcel’, ‘uglycel’, ‘wristcel’ carry no stigma or shame as they would in offline reality.
- In certain contexts, the use of misogynistic and homophobic slurs can be seen as compensatory masculinity speech acts. We propose that this is an under-researched function of slurs in philosophy and argue for that we can think of slurs in such contexts as having illocutionary compensatory force.
- Incels take themselves to be creating new hermeneutic resources via the ‘black pill’ ideology. We identified three reasons for why these are not fruitful hermeneutic resources: (i) incel tools do not aim for equality (they wish to subordinate women and keep themselves in a low-status social position); (ii) Incel ideology does not entail consistency (e.g. certain concepts, such as lookism, are utilised as a social phenomenon in other contexts its seen to follow from biological essentialism); (iii) tools provided by the black pill prevent any possibility for intra/inter-group reflection.
- Incels employ the taboos of mainstream society to construct their communities. These include engaging in misogynistic and self-loathing speech. Such practices are encouraged and rewarded on the forum.

Were all planned outcomes achieved?

If not, how did you mitigate non-achievement?

We feel that we achieved the majority of the outcomes were met. Some planned outcomes naturally developed into different projects. For example, the content from 'Women, the Scapegoat' paper ended up contributing to two papers listed in the 'under review' section (papers (2) and (3)) as well as, a future paper we're planning to write on illocutionary pluralism.

Other projects were put to one side due to specific deadlines detailed below.

- *The Philosophical Quarterly* SI deadline was the 30th of June. Due to the journal's prestige, we felt it was better to spend the month of June trying to finish off the paper on conceptual engineering whilst leaving some other projects for future investigation.
- The forthcoming paper ('Resistance through Revision') had its revisions due by the 27th of June.

Due to anticipated difficulties concerning author agreement rates in the Move Analysis paper (Manuscript section) and some personal circumstances of RAs, we are still working on the empirical findings concerning incel forums.
