Young researchers shine at the School of Medicine Research Showcase



While the sun was shining in July, the spotlight shone on young researchers presenting at the School of Medicine Research Showcase. During this high-profile event, postgraduate research students and new investigators (within 5 years of receiving their PhD) were able to showcase their research in an oral or poster presentation and compete to win £1,000 towards attendance at a scientific conference. Judging panels of senior academics were kept busy, with 60 oral and poster presentations to assess over the course of the day. Speakers were judged on the quality of their research and their ability to communicate and answer questions from the audience and judging panel. Similar criteria were used to judge the posters, with each presenter grilled by a roving judging panel.

At the end of the day, prizes were awarded by President and Vice-Chancellor, Professor Alan Gilbert. The prize for best oral presentation by a new investigator was awarded to Dr Angela Simpson from the Academic Division of Medicine and Surgery, for her presentation on how increased exposure to endotoxin, a poison contained in bacteria found in dust, could help reduce sensitivity to allergies and eczema. Best oral presentation by a postgraduate student was won by Dr Will Dixon of the arc Epidemiology Unit. Will described his analysis of the safety of a new generation of biological drugs used to treat rheumatoid arthritis (pictured above).



Paula's research is investigating the role of hormone receptors in the survival of one of the most aggressive forms of lung cancer. Adam Pickard of the same Division won best poster by a postgraduate student for his studies into the molecular mechanisms involved in the development of congestive heart failure (pictured below)



The meeting was a great success and attracted an audience of more than 500, including academics, researchers and postgraduate students from across the School of Medicine and The University, and representatives of the School's industrial partners and research funding bodies. Associate Head and Research Director of the School, Professor Phil Baker, said:

"This event is part of a University-wide policy of supporting early-career researchers, as well as publicising their exciting work. We are greatly encouraged by the high level of interest we have received, and very proud of the researchers who have presented their work today."

Arts and Humanities Research Council

The AHRC highlights within their Guide for Postgraduate Award Holders 2006-2007 that the



development of key generic skills should be a compulsory training requirement for all research students. The Council identifies the Joint Statement of Skills Training Requirements for Research students as being a useful tool in helping students and institutions frame their own research training provision.



Context behind the national skills training agenda for postgraduate research students

The development of skills training systems within each of the four faculties has additional importance within the context of emerging government policy. Dating back to at least the Harris Report 1996 the government has been developing policy on how to provide additional support to research students to address two emerging issues in the modern economy, namely;

- Employers require a maintenance of the quality of researchers but an enhancement in the breadth of training
- · Employers need to start work with a larger portfolio of learning

In July 2003, the University received notification that the Government had accepted the main recommendations of Sir Gareth Roberts' "SET for Success" review. A primary recommendation of this report was the provision of at least two weeks' dedicated training a year principally in transferable skills for all postgraduate research students. As a result, the Research Councils would be allocated funds to provide additional transferable skills training for postgraduate research students and postdoctoral researchers.

The Joint Skills Statement of the Research Councils' Skills Training Requirements for Research Students outlines the skills a research student should acquire in addition to their main area of research study. These are backed by Government guidelines in response to the Roberts report, newly published QAA guidelines and HEFCE guidance.

Introducing the Faculty of Life Sciences new Statistics Training Course

From October their will be a new FLS Statistics resource available which combines a blended approach to training using on-line resources and face to face training. The course will include training in three main areas: improving the way you handle numbers and units; describing when and how to carry out the most common statistical tests using the computer package SPSS; and showing how you can design better experiments.

There will be some theory but the majority of the time will be spent carrying out hands on work, on the calculator, on a computer statistics package.

The content of the course will cover:

- Manipulating numbers and using SI units.
- · Variation: its cause and how to describe it.
- · Finding differences: the T-Tests and ANOVA.
- Finding associations: correlation and regression.
- Dealing with categorical data: the Chi-Square tests
- Dealing with non-normally distributed data and non parametric tests.
- · Designing experiments: replication, randomisation and blocking.
- · Presenting the results of statistical tests.

Postgraduate Research Student Conference Travel Funds

The aim of this scheme is to assist postgraduate researchers in attending national or international conferences to present their research. The PGR Conference Travel Funds will assist with the costs of travel and conference registration fees, and are intended to supplement the applicant's own contribution or funds from other sources. Students can apply for funding up to £250.00 for a conference visit in the UK and up to £450.00 for a conference visit outside the UK.


This fund will provide postgraduate research students with the opportunity to;

- refine their research by exposing it to national and international peer review by presenting a paper at a conference
- advance their research activities and also their visibility in the research community
- network and interact with some of the best researchers in their field
- gain essential experience in communicating and presenting their research and ultimately strengthening their communication and networking skills

Funds are open to those students registered for an MPhil, PhD, DBA, MD, EngD or an MA by Research at the University of Manchester (please note that students in their submission pending period are not eligible to apply for funding).

'The away day took place on August 4th and set out to inspire students to increase personal effectiveness by improving communication, organisation and skills. The afternoon began with our visiting speaker, Piero Vitelli providing an interactive lecture on effective communication skills. Piero works in communication consultancy and frequently works with PhD students on residential courses ran by UK GRAD. Piero's lecture included interactive exercises in which students explored both good and bad communications. Communicating our research to others with passion and clarity can be a daunting challenge to say the least, however, exercises such as 'How to explain your research to someone in the most boring way possible' had us all entertained and the message was firmly embedded that the way in which you communicate your research is important!


Dr Rachel Crossley, the Public engagement officer for the Faculty of Life Sciences here at The University of Manchester presented a session on non-research related scientific careers and talked about her own experiences which led her to her current role in public engagement. Rachel, Martin and Georgina each presented opportunities available to PhD students such as becoming a public engagement volunteer, and getting involved in outside events such as Biotech Yes, Researchers in Residence, and attending a GRADSchool residential course.

We ended the afternoon on a high, as six teams welcomed the challenge of a 2minute presentation in an anything-but-scientific style to communicate to the audience what one team member's research was about. We fell about laughing in the aisles as the arts/sciences divide disappeared and PhDs transcended into amateur dramatics. Thanks to Rachel's generous donation of HMV vouchers and two iPod Nanos, we were able to award the students who most embraced their thespian talents without inhibition. If things don't work out with research careers then there are some students who could undoubtedly pursue a career in the theatre!'

Employers Need Highly Skilled Social Science PhDs

A newly published ESRC report (May 'o6) sets out the findings of a review it has commissioned that evaluates both the needs of non-academic employers for highly skilled social scientists, and the extent to which social science PhD-holders in such employment are using the skills and knowledge developed during their doctorate,

This report entitled 'The employment of social science PhDs in academic and non-academic jobs: research skills and postgraduate training' provides clear evidence of demand across a range of employers for the skills and attributed acquired during a



social science PhD. It illustrates that PhD holders are highly employable in a number of sectors.

The review, which was conducted by Kate Purcell, Professor of Employment Studies at UWE, and Peter Elias, Professors of Employment Research at the University of Warwick, underlines the crucial importance of equipping UK social scientists with core research and related professional skills from an early stage n their career.

Part-time Student Away Day - Faculty of Humanities



Studying for a PhD presents a challenge but when this is combined with work and family commitments, it can be especially difficult. In recognition of this, and also to better identify the needs of its part-time researchers, the Faculty of Humanities held a skills training away day for part-time PGRs on 24th June. The away day took place at Chancellors and on a Saturday to enable part-time PGRs the opportunity to access training.

The day combined focus-group activity with introductory training in IT skills, project and time management. It gave part-time researchers in the Faculty the opportunity to meet, network and to exchange ideas, whilst also providing Faculty with valuable information on the problems part-time PGRs face. Chief among part-time researchers concerns were how to juggle work and research, the lack of interaction with other part-time students and administrative issues, for example, the difficulty of accessing the library outside of usual office hours.

Faculty invited participants to draw up a 'wish-list' of the things that would make part-time study easier. Among the items listed were dedicated training for part-time researchers, blocks of training such as a 'summer school,' more on-line provision and a network. As a direct consequence of the concerns expressed, the Faculty of Humanities will hold a block of three days training on April 19th, 20th and 21st (Thursday, Friday and Saturday). Part-time researchers are invited to register their interest in these training days via the on-line booking system www.humanities.manchester.ac.uk/training
