#### **Teaching Matters Workshops:**

Tuesday, 18th March 14.00 - 15.30: 'Exploring Cadmus in Canvas' Sign up <u>here</u> [forms.office.com]

Helen Perkins and Jo Williams (SEED eLearning team) will lead the 90-minute training workshop that introduces participants to Cadmus, a powerful assessment tool designed to create dynamic and inclusive assessments. We will explore the pedagogical potential of Cadmus and its integration with Canvas, our new Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)\* in preparation for September 2025 launch. The session will cover how we can use Cadmus as a tool for designing assessments that are aligned with your unit's ILOs and encourage engagement and learning. We will guide participants in how to set up a Cadmus assignment, what settings to use, how to access submissions and mark them, and best practice in providing meaningful feedback for your students. We will also provide an overview of the features that support students with additional needs, such as ways to manage extensions efficiently, and the learner analytics which Cadmus provides.

### Wednesday, 26th March 13.00 - 14.30 'Human-centred design in university education' Sign up<u>here [forms.office.com]</u>

Led by Professor **Sarah Dyer**, this session is a change to explore human-centred (HCD) approach in education. HCD is an umbrella term which includes things like design thinking and service design. HCD asks us to spend more time exploring problems then we often do, with a focus on having empathy with the people effected and understanding the problems in context. Rather than adopting one high stakes solution it asks that we prototype and text possible approaches with users. I have worked in a variety of contexts with HCD. I will reflect on these and introduce some possible ways in, for if you are interested in trying this approach. There is no need to know anything about HCD before the session The workshops will also be useful for colleagues applying for Advance HE fellowships.
