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> Santiago Yahuarcani: The Beginning of Knowledge 4 July 2025 – 4 January 2026

The Whitworth is proud to present *Santiago Yahuarcani: The Beginning of Knowledge*, the first international solo exhibition dedicated to the artist and Indigenous leader of the Uitoto people. The exhibition brings together almost 30 works from 2010 to the present day, showcasing Yahuarcani's narrative-rich artistic practice and profound cultural resistance over the last fifteen years. Organised thematically, the exhibition presents new paintings as well as loans from major international collections.

Working from Pebas, a remote town in northern Peru, Yahuarcani creates paintings using natural dyes on *llanchama*, a bark cloth derived from the *ojé* tree native to the Amazon. From origin stories to the sounds of the jungle and memories of the enslavement of the Uitoto people during the Putumayo genocide (1879-1912), his paintings capture the life and history of the Uitoto people past and present. Details of trees, plants, animals and scenes found in everyday life are elevated as treasured memories in Yahuarcani's work, highlighting the importance of the preservation of Indigenous knowledge. Yahuarcani's paintings are urgent acts of education and resistance, honouring intergenerational legacies and inviting us to consider how Indigenous knowledge can shape a more just and interconnected future.



The exhibition also presents sequences from Núria Frigola Torrent's poetic film 'The Song of the Butterflies' (2020) which documents how ancestral knowledge and familial ties inform Yahuarcani's artistic vision.

The Beginning of Knowledge is presented as part of the 2025 Manchester International Festival and supported by The Ampersand Foundation. The exhibition is organised by the Whitworth in collaboration with Museu de Arte de São Paulo Assis Chateaubriand, São Paulo and Museo Universitario del Chopo, UNAM, Mexico City. After the premiere at the Whitworth, the exhibition will tour to the partner venues in 2026 and 2027.

Curated by Professor Sook-Kyung Lee (Director, the Whitworth), Darren Pih (Head of Exhibitions & Collections, the Whitworth), Hannah Vollam (Assistant Curator, the Whitworth), Amanda Carneiro (Curator, Museu de Arte de São Paulo) and Miguel A. López (Chief Curator, Museo Universitario del Chopo, Mexico City).

The exhibition will be accompanied by a new and extensively illustrated publication with texts on Yahuarcani's practice by Amanda Carneiro, Miguel A. López, Darren Pih, and Pablo José Ramírez, as well as an intergenerational conversation between Santiago Yahuarcani and his artist son Rember Yahuarcani. This is the first major monographic publication on the artist's work.

Santiago Yahuarcani, artist said: "My work is rooted in the legacy of my ancestors, those who saw the universe not as something to conquer, but to revere. To them, the land was more than soil and stone. So much so they called it our mother, who is indeed sacred and alive."

Sook-Kyung Lee, Director, the Whitworth said: "We are delighted to present Santiago Yahuarcani's poignant yet powerful work as part of the 2025 Manchester International Festival. The artist brings intimate stories of Indigenous cultures of the Amazons to Manchester, highlighting our shared values. Supportive communities, intergenerational learning, and sustainable ecology are among the important pillars of Yahuarcani's life and art, which resonate beyond his environment."

Low Kee Hong, Creative Director, Factory International and Manchester International Festival said: "This year's Manchester International Festival champions indigenous artists and creators from the Global South, to inspire fresh perspectives and invite us all to dream differently. We are so excited to present Santiago Yahuarcani's: The Beginning of Knowledge as part of the festival. From the climate catastrophe to colonial dispossession, we all have so much to learn from his works utilising the wisdom of the ancient Uitoto people."

About Santiago Yahuarcani

Santiago Yahuarcani (b. 1960, Pebas, Peru) is a self-taught artist and Indigenous leader of the Uitoto people. His mother, Martha López Pinedo, was a descendant of Gregorio López, the only member of the Aimeni (White Heron) clan who migrated from La Chorrera, today part of the Colombian Amazon, to the Ampiyacu River region, now the Peruvian Amazon, as part of the relocation of enslaved Indigenous populations to work in the rubber industry. His work addresses issues of the documentation of Indigenous knowledge, Amazonian ontologies, and the politics of genocide against their ancestors.



Yahuarcani's work was presented in *Stranieri Ovunque – Foreigners Everywhere*, as part of the Venice Biennale (2024), as well as the Toronto Biennial of Art (2024), the Mercosur Biennale (2025) and the Gwangju Biennale (2023). His works are held by KADIST, Museo de Arte de Lima, Museu de Arte de São Paulo, Museo Nacional Centro de Arte Reina Sofía, Madrid, Tate, London, Museum of Modern Art, New York, Van Abbemuseum, Eindhoven, and the Whitworth, The University of Manchester, among others.
