The Klezmer Ensemble

The Michael Kahan Kapelye (MKK) is the Music Department's klezmer ensemble. The historical roots of klezmer lie in the wedding music of Eastern European Ashkenazi, Yiddish-speaking Jewry. Its survival owes much to its move from this Old World to the New World (in the early part of the twentieth century) and the US-led klezmer revival (beginning in the 1970s). Currently, klezmer is a dynamic world genre as well as Jewish heritage music.

The University ensemble is named after a prominent Manchester musician (Michael Kahan) who, much like the current and former members of MKK, performed in the classical and klezmer genres amongst others. Michael was tragically killed in 2008, and the ensemble was formed in 2011 by Ros Hawley and Richard Fay to celebrate Michael's contribution to music in the city generally, and to klezmer performance in particular. Since 2018, the ensemble has been led by MKK-alumnus Daniel Mawson, alongside Richard, who tutor each cohort of ensemblists.

Each year, the ensemble reforms with a new set of students whose ensemble performance is partly assessed through their MKK performance. For almost all of them klezmer is an unfamiliar genre when they start working together in October. Many of them will develop a passion for this music from which new ensembles form.

The Michael Kahan Kapelye forms a central part in a now flourishing klezmer scene in Manchester where, as led by Daniel and Richard, current and former ensemblists join with members of the wider community to perform for: the bi-annual Halle Klezmer Evenings of Music and Dance, the monthly Klezmer Tune Club, the monthly KlezJam session, and regular visits to perform for reminiscence and well-being sessions in local Jewish Care Homes (Heathlands Village, Belong Morris Feinmann). These klezmer activities have been "highly commended" and "commended" in the university's making a difference in Social Responsibility Award scheme in 2021, 2022, and 2023.
