Application Criteria

Essential:

- Interest in economic justice, social security and child poverty
- Ability to work independently
- Good analytical skills
- Proficiency in Excel

Desirable:

- Ability to use statistical software to perform basic analysis and to produce charts and tables
- Good writing skills and ability to explain statistical results clearly
- Understanding of the social security system and wider political context

Project Outline

The successful candidate will be engaged in an analysis and policy research project that seeks to understand different routes to reducing child poverty through changes to the the tax and benefit system. This work will include extensive use of the IPPR tax-benefit model for which training will be provided. The research will explore topics such as:

- Poverty and inequality
- Universal Credit
- Distributional analysis
- Employment and pay growth

Through the project you will gain knowledge and experience of social security policy, microsimulation modelling and policy development. The successful candidate will work with the Principal Economist to produce innovative and fresh analysis to better understand policy options for reducing child poverty. This will directly inform our programme of work influencing the government's child poverty strategy.
