Yuki Kihara: Darwin in Paradise Camp 3 October 2025 – 1 March 2026



The Whitworth is proud to present a solo exhibition by interdisciplinary artist Yuki Kihara (b.1975).

Darwin in Paradise Camp will present Kihara's acclaimed installation *Paradise Camp*, originally presented at the Aotearoa New Zealand Pavilion at the 59th Venice Biennale in 2022, as part of its first UK tour, augmented by a striking video work, *Darwin Drag* (2025), created for its UK audiences.

For over twenty years, Japanese-Sāmoan artist Yuki Kihara has delved into art histories and archives to unpick the effects of colonialism on the peoples and ecology of the Pacific. Her visually compelling projects centre and empower the voices and experiences of the Fa'afafine and Fa'atama in Sāmoa, traditional yet marginalised third gender communities to which the artist belongs.

Paradise Camp, Kihara's most ambitious project to date, reconceives famous paintings of Tahiti and its people by French modernist artist Paul Gauguin (1848-1903). Through archival research, Kihara links Gauguin's paintings made during this time to colonial photographs taken in Sāmoa. Described by Kihara as an act of 'upcycling', she recreates Gauguin's compositions in a series of 12 resplendent tableau photographs, shot on location in Upolu Island, Sāmoa. Collaborating with Fa'afafine models and production crew, Kihara repurposes these cultural artefacts from what she regards as the 'landfill' of stereotypical Pacific Island imagery in order to speak to, and from, queer Indigenous worlds in a profound gesture of reclamation.

Kihara's stunning photographic series will be displayed on a panoramic oceanscape photograph, providing fresh perspectives on the presented works by Gauguin, including *Bathers at Tahiti* (1897) on loan from The Barber Institute of Fine Arts and rarely seen works on paper from the Whitworth's collection. On display nearby will be the *Vārchive*, telling the backstory of Kihara's research and a set



of video works that includes a five-part Fa'afafine talk show and an imagined *talanoa* (conversation) between Kihara and Gauguin.

Paradise Camp is an evolving project, introducing new components at each location. For its UK audiences, Kihara presents her new work *Darwin Drag* that engages with recent research into how famed evolutionary biologist Charles Darwin (1809-1882) shaped his findings to suggest that non-heteronormative species and same-sex attraction in animals was rare and unnatural, to conform with the conservative values of the Victorian period.

In *Darwin Drag,* Kihara combines Charles Darwin's evolutionary theories with queer aesthetics in the animal 'queendom'. It features Kihara prosthetically transformed into Charles Darwin, who confides in a renowned Sāmoan drag queen, BUCKWEAT, that he has been unhappy about keeping his secret about queer species in the closet for so long. It proceeds to introduce the fish species with 'Fa'afafine traits' found in the ocean surrounding the Sāmoan archipelago, including clownfish and parrotfish. Blending scholarly research with theatrical staging, the video is presented within a replica of a 'fale', a traditional, open structure Sāmoan house, alongside a collection of fish specimens.

The exhibition will weave together art historical paintings, wallpapers, specimens, contemporary photographs and videos, props, and archives to reveal interconnected histories and nurture an alternate Indigenous queer world based on self-determination, where community and care are central.

About Yuki Kihara

Yuki Kihara (b. 1975 Apia, Samoa) is a conceptual artist working and living in Sāmoa. Her interdisciplinary practice challenges dominant historical narratives and their socio-political persistence in contemporary culture. She incorporates Sāmoan aesthetics and cultural codes through performance, sculpture, film, photography, and curation. In 2022, Kihara represented the Aotearoa New Zealand Pavilion at the 59th Venice Biennale with *Paradise Camp*, accompanied by a dedicated publication. The exhibition has since toured to the Powerhouse Museum, Sydney (2023); the Saletoga Sands Resort, Upolu Island (2024) and the Sainsbury Centre for Visual Arts, Norwich (2025).

Kihara gained prominence following her solo exhibition *Living Photographs* (2008) presented at The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York. Subsequent solo exhibitions were presented at Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek, Copenhagen; Gus Fisher Gallery | Te Whare Toi o Gus Fisher, Auckland; **Wereld Museum Leiden;** and the Fine Arts Museum of San Francisco, among others. Kihara's works have been presented in numerous exhibitions, including the Gwangju Biennale (2023); Aotearoa New Zealand at the 59th Venice Biennale (2022); Aichi Triennale (2022); Bangkok Art Biennale (2018); Honolulu Biennale (2017); Asia Pacific Triennial (2015 and 2002) and Sakahàn Quinquennial (2013) to name a few. Her works are held in over 30 permanent collections including the Museum of Modern Art, New York; The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; British Museum, London; Kaohsiung Museum of Fine Arts and Te Papa Tongarewa Museum of New Zealand, Wellington.

Kihara was a research fellow at the National Museums of World Cultures in The Netherlands from 2017 – 2022; and is currently an affiliate of Ecological Art Practices – a research cluster led by THE NEW INSTITUTE Centre for Environmental Humanities (NICHE) at the Ca 'Foscari University of Venice.



Kihara is also co-director of Talanoa Arts Forum, a curatorial agency facilitating international cultural and artistic exchange in Sāmoa.
