- Select at least 20 credits of core units in the pathway you wish to specialise at level 2



Must do a methods course in at least one specialism- preferably the one in which will do Year 3 dissertation.




YEAR THREE





BECOME A PART OF THE STORY

One year after graduating: 9 out of 10 social science graduates are in professional employment and/or further study. This proportion is higher than graduates of STEM (science, technology, engineering and maths) or arts and humanities.

A higher proportion of social science graduates are in **managerial and senior official roles** than STEM or A&H.

A higher proportion of social science graduates are employed in **'professional, scientific, and technical'** and **'financial industries'** than STEM or A&H graduates.




PHILOSOPHY



What is philosophy?

Thinking carefully and creatively about what exists, what matters, and how to find out.

Why study philosophy as part of BASS?

Philosophers are valued in interdisciplinary contexts because thinking carefully and creatively about the foundations of all disciplines – their conceptual frameworks, guiding values, and research methods – is fundamental to their success. And that's what philosophers do!

Why does the world need philosophers?

Employers are crying out for the key transferable skills that are at the heart of philosophy and which we will help you cultivate: being able to construct clear and persuasive arguments; being able to solve problems creatively; being able to identify and interrogate assumptions and reimagine problems; being open-minded and enthusiastic about engaging with new ideas and perspectives; working with other to tackle the important issues.

SOCIOLOGY

What is sociology?

- Sociologists develop theories to explain how societies function and change.
- Key areas include social class, power, action, practices, gender, race, etc.
- An empirical discipline which requires evidence. Evidence can be qualitative or quantitative.

Why study sociology as part of BASS?

- A wide range of interesting optional modules: Family, intimacies and sexualities, power and protest, understanding social media, human animal relations...
- Our courses focus on research skills and how research design affects our knowledge of the world around us

Sociology and your future

- A discipline of transferable skills: not job-specific but job-relevant
- Employability skills developed throughout the course: Research skills, data analysis, and cultural competency.

What is criminology?

- The scientific study of crime, criminal behaviour, victims, and the systems (police, court, prisons) society uses to respond to them


Why criminology matters?

- Helps explain why crime happens, not just who did it
- Informs better, fairer public policy and safer communities
- Improves responses to victims and reduces repeat offending
- Trains students in evidence-based thinking, research, and communication = skills valuable across many careers.

What will you learn?

- Real world problems: gangs, cybercrime, domestic abuse, youth justice.
- Practical skills: interviewing, data analysis, critical thinking, ethical reasoning.
- Career paths: policing, probation, victim support, research, social work, law, policy, community organisations.


