The Whitworth Hall

Did you know?

The Whitworth Hall (named after benefactor Sir Joseph Whitworth) was the last of the quadrangle of buildings to be designed by Alfred Waterhouse RA for Owens College.

It was opened by HRH the Prince of Wales (later King George V) in 1902. The Hall's organ was gifted by Enriqueta Rylands, founder of the John Rylands Library.

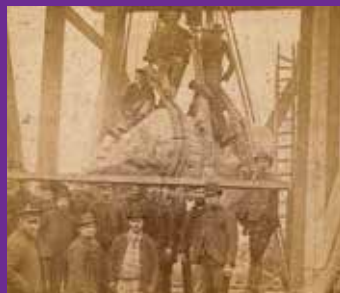

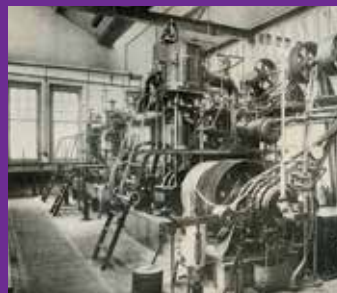

Civic ambition, global reach – *From Manchester for the world*

In autumn 2025, we launched our strategy to 2035, with a clear ambition to be a great civic University for the 21st century.

This new strategy is rooted in Manchester and the North, focusing on a combination of foundations and strategic leaps to create knowledge, innovation and solutions that bring local benefits and scale globally.



University tops UK rankings for graduate employer interest

Manchester regained the top spot as the most targeted university by top employers, according to The Graduate Market in 2026 report by High Fliers.

This ranking demonstrates how Manchester graduates remain a priority target for employers in the face of a challenging graduate job market.

Kelly-Anne Mahon, Head of Access, Student Employability, Success and Development, said: "Our position in these rankings reflects not just the quality of our students, but also the partnerships and support across the University that help them succeed in a competitive landscape."



Number one university for sustainability impact

We rank first in the world for progress towards the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals in the *Times Higher Education* Sustainability Impact Ratings – the only institution to place in the top ten every year since the rankings were launched in 2019.



University hosts BRIT trophy unveiling

We hosted the unveiling of the official 2026 BRIT Awards trophy, designed by renowned interiors designer Matthew Williamson, at the Martin Harris Centre for Music and Drama.

The event marked a major cultural moment ahead of the music awards ceremony, which for the first time in its history was hosted in Manchester.



Manchester quizzers win University Challenge for fifth time

Our University Challenge team were crowned winners of the UK's toughest quizzing tournament.

The victory was a historic one – with this fifth win (2006, 2009, 2012, 2013, 2025) we became the most successful university in the history of the competition, joint with Imperial College London.

Team member Ray Power said: "We never expected to win; we were just happy to be there. The whole thing was nerve-wracking! It was so intense and felt so much like a super weird school trip!"

CHALLENGE ACCEPTED

Challenge Accepted: global fundraising campaign announced

Challenge Accepted, our first major global fundraising and volunteering campaign, aims to drive transformative change across research, student support, innovation and culture, and to back bold solutions to the world's most pressing problems.

The campaign marks a defining moment for the University as we look ahead to our third century, building on 200 years of turning world-changing discoveries into practical impact.

World-first AI partnership with Microsoft

At the start of 2026 we announced a strategic collaboration with Microsoft, becoming the first university in the world to give Microsoft 365 Copilot access and training to every student and colleague.

It illustrates how, 75 years after the publication of Alan Turing's seminal paper *Computing Machinery and Intelligence*, Manchester is leading the way in artificial intelligence (AI) research and innovation and creating an AI research ecosystem that's accelerating the journey to real-world impact.



\$1 million gift will fund Undergraduate Access Scholarships

A \$1 million gift made through the North American Foundation for The University of Manchester (NAFUM) will help support Undergraduate Access Scholarships.

The contribution, made by a donor who wished to remain anonymous, will primarily assist students who are care-experienced or estranged from their families.

The donor said: "This donation has been made in honour of the history of this world-class institution, which I am immensely proud to be associated with."

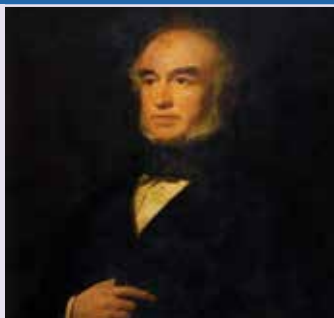
LEADING THE WAY

1874

Edward Ryley Langworthy

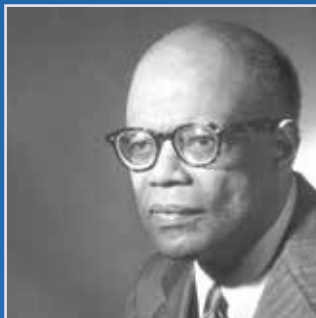
The Langworthy Chair, a position later held by five Nobel laureates, is created by the legacy of this donor to the University.



1979

Sir Arthur Lewis

Britain's first Black professor, Arthur Lewis wins the 1979 Nobel Prize for Economics.



1906

Dame Christabel Pankhurst DBE

Prior to her role in the suffragette movement, she graduates in law at a time when it was illegal for women to practise the profession.



1945

Prof Alan Turing OBE FRS

The famed wartime codebreaker joins the University, where he later gains a reputation as the father of modern computing.



1908

Sir Ernest Rutherford OM FRS

This pioneer of chemistry and physics, who would later 'split' the atom, becomes the University's first Nobel Prize winner in 1908.



1945

Ellen Wilkinson

Ellen Wilkinson is appointed as Britain's first female Minister for Education. As a student she won scholarships for every stage of her education.



1998**Prof Brian Cox OBE FRS**

Graduating in Physics, Brian Cox starts a scientific career that has seen him become a household name through his work to popularise science.

**2023****Ella Podmore MBE**

Aged just 27, materials engineer Ella Podmore receives an MBE from the Prince of Wales for services to Engineering, Innovation and Diversity.

**2004****Prof Alan Gilbert AO**

Alan Gilbert is appointed President and Vice-Chancellor in 2004, later establishing Equity and Merit Scholarships and the Manchester Access Programme.

**2019****Jesse Armstrong**

Author and screenwriter Jesse Armstrong wins the first of his five Emmy awards for his satirical drama *Succession*. It receives widespread critical acclaim.

**2006****Prof Danielle George MBE**

Danielle George is awarded her PhD. Ten years later she receives an MBE for her services to promote public engagement in engineering.

**2017****Naa Acquah**

Naa Acquah is named General Secretary of the Students' Union – the first Black woman to hold the position.

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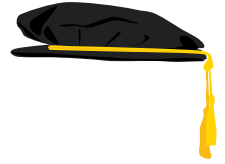
