A SUSTAINED EFFORT

The University has announced significant progress in just over a year since it signed up to an international declaration to demonstrate its commitment to sustainable development.

In 2005, the President and Vice-Chancellor joined more than 300 higher education institutions around the world in signing up to the Talloires Declaration - the official commitment to sustainable development in higher education.

Professor Bob Munn, Vice-President (Teaching and Learning) who is leading the University's commitment, said:"Our activity to date represents significant progress in a number of areas against the ten-point action plan of Talloires but we are also currently conducting a detailed review of progress. The results of this exercise will be available on the sustainable development website later in the year."

He added:"The wide range of activities taking place across this campus are co-ordinated by The Sustainable Development Steering Group. We have achieved encouraging results in the Business in the Community Corporate Responsibility Survey, commonly used by businesses to benchmark themselves against a wide range of sustainability criteria."

Other achievements/activity include:

*Fairtrade products have been introduced on campus over the last year and a formal Fairtrade Policy has now been adopted that commits the University and the Students' Union to use and promote these products. An Ethical Policy is also being developed, recognizing the University's obligation not to invest in companies whose activities are considered to be harmful to people and the environment.

*The University has recently been awarded the Gold Award in the Manchester Environmental Business Pledge scheme, which recognizes engagement with local environment projects. For example, the Directorate of Sports Trading and Residential Services (STARS) is working with Manchester biodiesel company, Green Gold, who will collect all the University's waste cooking oil and process it into biodiesel. The 147 bus service through the campus runs on biodiesel from Green Gold, helping to reduce carbon emissions.

*Estates are looking at a variety of measures to improve energy efficiency and reduce wastage and hopefully costs while reducing the University's carbon footprint.

*The University's growing involvement with local communities includes helping to plant fruit trees at a local school and cleaning up a local park. The University offers support to communities through volunteering activities, which will increasingly involve students on the Manchester Leadership Programme as it expands this year.


Professor Munn added:"Individuals may not be able to achieve much alone, but a large number of us making small improvements can help to make the University significantly more sustainable. In the coming year, such collective action will be supported by more activities that aim to foster environmental literacy - a key goal of the Talloires Declaration."

THE VENTURE COMPETITION

The aim of the University of Manchester Venture Competition is to give staff and students the knowledge and skills they need to turn their ideas into viable business propositions.

Venture Out is an ideas competition for individuals or teams which runs in the first semester. It involves completing a short entry form outlining the idea and its commercial application. There will be events and workshops during the semester to encourage individuals to put forward their ideas. The entries are then put forward before a judging panel and the best ideas can win cash prizes of up to £1,000. This will be launched at the start of the first semester and prizes will be awarded at the end of that semester.

Venture Further is a business enterprise competition which runs in the second semester. Entrants will be provided with support and workshops to help them with their entry and putting together a business plan. The initial judging panel will select the best teams who will then be asked to give a short presentation to the final judging panel. The top prize of £25,000 and runners up will then be announced at an awards dinner. This will be launched at the start of the second semester and prizes will be awarded at the end of that semester.

For both Venture Out and Venture Further there is no restriction on team size and entries are welcome from both staff and students. However at least 50% of the team must be currently registered students at The University of Manchester.



The second annual Study Abroad Fair, aimed at promoting opportunities to undergraduate students from all subject areas, will be held on 7 November from 12-5pm in the Whitworth Hall.

Running a 117-bed city-centre hotel, a modern Hall of Residence for 530 students, including 100 postgrads, and the Manchester Conference Centre is all in a day's work for Mike Mitchell and his team. And they operate round the clock. Indeed, during the summer vacation, they run what is in effect the biggest hotel in Manchester, looking after up to 326 conference delegates residing in Weston Hall as well as the normal Days Hotel clients.

Mike certainly lives up to his formal title of the University's General Manager of Year-round Conference Centres, within STARS (Sports, Trading and Residential Services). But he is also Manager and Licensee of the Days Hotel.

"What we have here is unique in the UK university system, but it all fits together extremely well, enabling us to offer a wide variety of accommodation and conference facilities," he says. Taking under his wing Chancellors as well gives the organisation a further option, enabling him to offer "the best of both worlds", city centre or country house-style accommodation. Between the two, they have nearly 200 bedrooms, 26 meeting rooms and two theatres, including the Weston Theatre, with its high specification of audio-visual equipment.

The key to the whole operation is the original concept of Weston Hall some 15 years ago. Mike brought his managerial experience in the hotel business to launch the venture, which comprised the then newest form of student accommodation, with en-suite rooms, equipped for internet access, and a Residential Management Training Centre. After a couple of years' operation, he saw the way

ahead and turned the latter into the Manchester Conference Centre and Hotel, offering a 24/7 service.

Since then, the organisation has moved with the times, and with the development of the city's business and tourist trade, bringing sharp competition as more and more hotel chains have set up shop here.

"Following our expansion of both Weston Hall and the hotel facilities in 2000, I saw the need to get involved with a hotel brand in order to keep pace," says Mike. "My proposal was approved and we linked up with Days, famed for its inns and hotels across America, but only just breaking into the UK market. It has benefited both of us, giving them a Manchester venue and us an established brand name." The Days Hotel Manchester City, to give it its full title, was inaugurated in 2004, the first for the chain in the north-west.

The hotel now has its secure place, with a 3-star AA rating and pitched between the budget and the 5-star hotels in the city. Along with the Manchester Conference Centre and Chancellors, it operates as a limited company outside the University in order to compete commercially.

"it's a busy and challenging enterprise, but a rewarding one," says Mike. "We are privileged in what we have to offer to the Manchester academic community whilst being an integral part of a vibrant city."

GURDEEP THIARA

Curator for Community Engagement, The Manchester Museum

The Manchester Museum is reaching – and is aiming further to reach – parts of the community it has never reached before. By reaching out to and bringing into the Museum people who before were "out there" but not involved, a series of initiatives are producing some telling results. And the task of fulfilling the aim is certainly "just the job" for Gurdeep Thiara, our first Curator for Community Engagement.

"We are bringing people together, learning from one another, bridging some gaps and crossing disciplines," she says. "Bringing community voices from the periphery into the core of the museum is an enormous achievement."

The nature of her job is perhaps best and most understandably exemplified by her current project, entitled Collective Conversations – an award winning project for innovative practice. (Museums Libraries and Archives Council). "We invite people to come into the Museum, look at objects on display and see behind the scenes – and tell their own stories about the things they see," Gurdeep explains. "They add a unique dimension to the objects by expressing their personal response and perhaps sharing their memories relating to objects which form part of their own culture, often giving the curators a different slant."

Each story is developed into a filmed conversation for display in the Museum and on the website. "Anyone can take part," says Gurdeep. "The aim is to get them involved and to enrich other people's experience and understanding. It is very rewarding.

Gurdeep's own experience has equipped her for the job. An MMU graduate in Social Sciences, she qualified as a teacher, but quickly turned to challenging community work both as a volunteer and as a professional. She worked in Manchester for some years with women victims of domestic violence and with young people with mental health problems. "Essentially, I was supporting people in crisis who needed support to find inner strength," she says. "It was highly rewarding, but I needed to move on."

In 2002, she did move on, taking on the challenge of Outreach Officer for the Museum, charged with a two-year Heritage Lottery Fund project to work with South Asian communities across all age groups. "It was very inspiring," she says. "I never imagined that a museum could be so busy and outward-looking. I found the new work culture challenging and upbeat."

The result of the project was the inspiring exhibition Transformations in 2004, in which five artists explored through their installations topics like immigration, adolescence, sexuality, and celebrity. For example one artist explored the contemporary cultural and ideological significances of the wearing of the hijab. The exhibition achieved her objective of involving all age groups and crossing some boundaries between "safe" and "sensitive" themes.

With that success behind her, she took time out to have a baby boy, before returning to lead the first phase of Collective Conversations, central to the Museum's commitment to making its collections more accessible, as part of the University's 2015 goal 9 Community Agenda. This project is funded by the regional North West Museums Hub. Beginning with the Anthropology collections, she set about bringing in a range of people to respond to objects which interested or meant something special to them. People came from Somali and Sudanese refugee groups, from amongst pensioners involved with the University Settlement, from the Greater Manchester Coalition of Disabled People. "It gave us a fresh and personal way of looking at things," says Gurdeep. One very special participant was a Native American Mohawk called Kahente, who was able to add particular resonance to objects relating to the community she grew up in and the self determination of the Mohawk people.

Now, in the next phase of Collective Conversations, Gurdeep has been asked to expand the interaction beyond Anthropology to include the Archaeology, Botany and Natural Science Collections.

With her infectious enthusiasm, charm and ready sense of humour, she is ideally suited to taking forward the next phase: "It is becoming much bigger, increasingly challenging, but more and more rewarding."

ANY QUESTIONS?

A number of staff have raised questions about why so much paper was distributed with last month's UniLife and Staff Update, which carried several publications/inserts in the polylope which amounted to a lot of paper which may go unread. You asked why not put publications online to save money and help the environment?

Sustainability and environmental issues are taken extremely seriously by the University which signed up to the Talloires Declaration last year – the official commitment to environmental sustainability in higher education – and has made considerable progress in this area (see front page story).

UniLife and Staff Update are printed on paper from sustainable forests, this is a more environmentally sustainable method of paper production than recycling, where the associated sorting and bleaching processes can cause great environmental damage. It is worth mentioning that no additional copies of any of the publications were printed specifically for this mailing.

The plastic envelope or polylope allows several items to be inserted and distributed along with UniLife and Staff Update rather than requiring separate mailings therefore saving time, money and resources.

In terms of just producing UniLife and Staff Update online, it is important to remember that more than 10% of University staff do not have access to a computer at work. Also, our readership surveys have shown in the past that many people prefer to have a printed copy that they can read away from their desk. Online magazines are more useful as a reference source and archive and both magazines are available on the Universitys'website.

The decision to distribute a personal copy of UniLife and Staff Update to every member of staff was taken as a direct response to the findings of the first staff survey and the Internal Communications audit conducted in 2004/2005 which involved widespread consultation with staff. Former UMIST staff were used to receiving individual copies of their newsletters and many former VUM staff complained that the distribution arrangements meant they never saw theirs. Research shows that UniLife and Staff Update are well received publications and widely read.


